CROFT PARISH COUNCIL REPORT FOR MAY 2017 - APRIL 2018

This period has been a challenging time for the village of Croft and will continue to be for the next 12 months and possibly longer.

Warrington Borough Council produced a Draft Local Plan which indicated that they would need 60 houses to be built on the Green Belt around Croft Village, and also produced a list of developers who would like to build on the Green Belt, it came to over 1000 dwellings. The Borough are now looking into all these and will produce a Local Plan report, hopefully in October/November. We joined forces with Culcheth & Glazebury Parish Council as well as Winwick Parish Council, who are also having the same problem and commissioned an expert Planning Consultant to send in a joint submission objecting to the proposals of building on the Green Belt. We also sent in a separate one reiterating that the Parish Council, as they have always been, were totally against building houses on Green Belt land. We have also sent in a joint objection with Culcheth & Glazebury Parish Council opposing two planning applications on the Parkside site.

We are continuing to support CDRAG in their monitoring of the HS2 proposals for the Golborne Rail Link, which will cause huge problems for the village.

We are pursuing WBC with both the problems of fly tipping generally and with flooding on Lady Lane. We are also requesting that they look urgently at providing a pedestrian crossing at Croft Primary School.

We have now in the process of starting up a Parish Plan Steering group, which will be a useful tool when the Local Plan is produced. If anyone would like to join the group, please contact the clerk.

Our Village Caretaker has retired after 10 years of keeping the Parish litter free. Councillors and residents would like to thank him for all his hard work and dedication and wish him well for the future.

Finally, the Parish Council would like to thank all the volunteers who help run all the different organisations in the village, you really do sterling work.

NEW CROFT PARISH COUNCIL WEBSITE

Croft Parish Council now has a new website. It is intended that this will now be the primary means of communication between the council and residents of Croft.

Previously, the council had a very limited presence on the general village website (www.croftvillagecheshire. co.uk).

However it had become increasingly obvious that the council needed its own site, used and updated by the Parish Clerk.

The Local Audit and Accountability

www.croftparishcheshire.org.uk Act of 2014 required that all smaller parish councils should be subject to a 'transparency code', whereby specified information about the council's operation 'must be published on a website which is publicly accessible free of charge'. Although Croft exceeds the Act's definition of 'smaller' (those with a turnover of less than £25,000), the government nevertheless made clear that larger councils were 'expected to follow' the code.

> Of course, this formal requirement comes at a time when in any case there is a much increased public expectation that bodies of all kinds will be accessible over the web, and Croft

Parish Council has been no exception in responding to this.

The new website will be used to publish agendas and minutes of the meetings, financial reports, as well as news, events and notices. The site even has the capability of running a poll on a particular issue should the need arise. There is a link to Warrington Borough Council's 'Report a Problem' facility. You may also subscribe your email address (see the footer of the home page) to receive any news by email, including a link to the newsletter.

CROFT NEWS

Croft Village Memorial Hall

2017 has seen the Memorial Hall continue to develop as we seek to achieve our newly defined mission of providing a facility that, in summary, is safe and compliant, used by the broader community, accessible to all, an enjoyable experience and ultimately sustainable. This is all in the context of being in an ever evolving local village and wider societal setting.

There has been good use made of the building from regular and one-off users, along with our own events (Barn Dance and Twilight Market) which brought people together for a fun time. We are doing more in social and printed media to get the message out that we exist and further drive usage. A building is only what you make of it – people are needed for it to come alive, otherwise it is just 'four walls and a roof'. We journey into 2018 with a number of projects in motion, including implementing an audio visual capability in conjunction with our good friends Croft WI, and an ambitious aim of running our first ever 'Beer. Gin & Prosecco' festival (June 15th & 16th - volunteers and sponsors needed). Little happens without the help of others and we are very grateful to all building users and supporting organisations.

2018 will see us launch a new initiative to give something back to the community – a structured volunteering opportunity for a young person in Year 11 High School ('5th Year' old currency) to join our committee for a few months, bring ideas from a different perspective and get an insight into how businesses and buildings operate – all aiming at enhancing their 'Personal Statement' as they then progress on into further education.

Lastly, of recent times there has been a lot of press coverage regarding the problem of 'loneliness' in society, across all ages and circumstances. We as a committee are very aware of this and put a lot of thought into the fine detail of what takes place at the hall so that people feel comfortable during their whole experience. Croft has a lot going on – as evidenced in this newsletter – and I ask you to encourage anyone you know who feels alone to consider joining in with an event at the Memorial Hall or indeed any of the village organisations – they'll certainly get a warm village welcome.

RAMBLERS ASSOCIATION

With the long wet, grey and muddy winter behind us, we can hopefully look forward to our public rights of way (PRoWs) drying out and, if you are a dog walker like myself, can be spared the displeasure of repeatedly hosing down best friend and boots.

As well as flooding all of Croft's lanes and PRoWs, the never ending rain over the last

few months has been the cause of further delays in the opening of the former Risley landfill site. Wouldn't it be nice to give it a more attractive name. Suggestions are welcome - I know it has been a waste site but please keep them clean and avoid the obvious Donald Trump quote.

Further drainage work has proved necessary together with improved security and health & safety measures after repeated acts of vandalism. I have been reliably informed by Biffa's site manager that the site was to open in March and therefore, should now be open. BUT - there's always a BUT - temporary closure of part of the site may occur in the summer to allow plant to work in dryer conditions and finally resolve flooding problems.

In addition to the disturbance that will be caused by the proposed HS2, further threats to our PRoWs and the wider countryside have arisen following the publication of the Local Plan (Preferred Development Option) by the Warrington Borough Council. This issue is bound to taunt us as the Plan develops but the Ramblers Association is maintaining a watch and advising communities in preparing their responses.

The above issues apart, last year was relatively uneventful at a local level but if you do come across obstructions, over ploughing or can suggest improvements to signage and waymarking, please get in touch.

When a girl turns seven she is usually ready to move on to Brownies. 1st Croft Brownie Unit meet at Croft Youth Centre each Thursday evening at 6.05 pm. Brownies is also part of Girlguiding and is open to girls when they turn seven years old.

Rainbows enjoy a lively programme of activities based on the four Jigsaw areas - Look, Learn, Laugh and Love. They gain badges as they complete a variety of Rainbow Roundabouts including 'All about me' and 'Festivals'. Brownies also enjoy working together, playing games and taking part in a wide variety of activities as they work through the Brownie Programme. Girlguiding is in the process of updating the programme and so we look forward to seeing what this includes but I am sure we will still have a lot of fun and games and badges.

July was Carnival time and the Rainbows joined the Brownies on their Carnival Float – 'Croft Bug Hotel and Garden'. We had an interesting variety of bugs on the float. The girls always enjoy being a part of this village event. Waving to everyone as we drive through the village on our float and then onto the field to run the 'Sand Game'. It is nearly Carnival time again and our thoughts are turning once again to the theme for our float!

Brownies and Rainbows help to look after the container garden outside the Youth Centre. They have helped with the planting and watering and we hope to develop this further this year.

In the autumn the Rainbows and Brownies completed the 'Clever Cogs' challenge. This included a set of engineering challenges developed by BAE systems and Girlguiding North West. We built towers, made a lava lamp, found out about floating and sinking and how materials react. The best meeting for both units has to be the one when we made our own slime! Last Spring we took the Rainbows to the Catalyst Science Discovery Centre where we were able to explore the galleries and try different activities, make soap and look at the amazing views from the Observation Tower including the new Mersey Gateway Bridge.

It is 30 years since the first Rainbow units opened and the local Rainbows celebrated this with fun at 'The Jungle' finishing

with party food and a big cake.

At the beginning of December some very excited Rainbows, together with the Rainbows from Locking Stumps went by coach to Pettypool, our County campsite in Sandiway, to visit Father Christmas. We had a busy time following a trail in the woodland, playing games and, the highlight of the afternoon, visiting Santa in his Grotto. As we got on the coach to leave was dark and the lights in the trees looked magical.

The Rainbows also enjoyed a special Christmas meeting with the Brownies when they all wore their Christmas jumpers and enjoyed games and food together The Youth Centre looked festive with the decorations we had made.

The Brownies have taken part in severa sleepovers this year. A small group of girls joined Brownies and Guides from the local area for a sleepover at Victoria Baths near Longsight in Manchester. The baths opened in 1906 and were designed as a prestigious baths complex. At present the building is being restored and is used as a wedding venue, a film set and, for several years now, Brownies and Guides have slept in an empty pool there. Last May was even more exciting because we were able to swim there! It was very, very cold. We are going again this May and hope the water will be lot warmer.

In July the Brownies camped at Pettypool, and then in the New Year they had a sleepover in the Brownie House there. We always enjoy these nights away. The girls are able to relax and have fun in a peaceful woodland setting.

The Brownies also spent an energetic evening at The North West Face Climbing Centre in Warrington and are very keen to go again.

Kathleen Cheyne and I have enjoyed being part of Croft Rainbows and Brownies for a number of years now. We find it to be both fun and very rewarding. We are really grateful to Chris Dodd for her help each week at Brownies and for the support of parents as they take their turn on the Rainbow rota. As always we are looking for extra help!! Croft Early Years is a Registered Charity and is managed by parents of the children who attend our setting. Children attending our setting are aged from 3 months to school age and we follow children's interests alongside their developmental next steps to ensure the provision, resources and activities meet each child's individual need. We are eligible to receive early years entitlement funding for two, three and four year old children who are entitled to receive this as well as the new 30 hour funding which became available to families in September 2017.

We have worked in partnership with parents and staff at Holcroft Grange in Culcheth to make monthly visits to visit the residents there. During our visits we have had some great fun making pumpkin pictures and playing with pumpkin play doh. We have had the parachute out and taken part in music and movement together and really enjoyed singing. Our December visit saw us making edible managers with a jelly baby Jesus!! It was really good fun, which everyone enjoyed. A number of residents and staff made a return visit us at Croft to watch our Christmas Performance

and enjoy a cup of tea. We all worked hard on our Christmas Tree for Newchurch Christmas Tree Festival and the float for Croft Carnival. A massive thank you to all our children, parents and their families for their support on these occasions - we couldn't have done all this without your support.

We have taken part a wide variety of different events and activities such as Boogie Bambinos, Mini Moves, Tennis Tots, and enjoyed visits from our local PCSO Dean and Chris from Manchester Fire Service. We have developed regular Forest School sessions facilitated by Ace Forest School and regularly access the woodland area to support our learning. We have a large outdoor provision which includes sand and water as well as our mud kitchen. The children freely access our outdoor area throughout the day as well as having access to a wide variety of play resources and activities inside.

Croft Early Years meet all the requirements of the Early Years Foundation Stage Curriculum and we have positive links with all our local primary schools and have access to St Lewis' School facilities such as the ICT suite, school hall and large outdoor equipment.

Croft Early Years opens from 8.30 am - 5.00 pm every day during term time and you would be very welcome to come and visit.

We have approximately 65 youth members across the 3 sections of Beavers (ages 6 to 8), Cubs (ages 8 to 10.5) and Scouts (ages 10.5 to 14); where we aim to deliver a balanced programme of activities in line with the Scout Association values and objectives.

Across the three sections over the last year our youth members have taken part in canoeing, sailing, rifle shooting, archery, night hikes, climbing, bike rides and judo to name just a few of the activities; they have visited a fire station, a mosque and an airport; and they have slept out in cardboard boxes for the homeless, attended District Camp and even made wooden reindeer!

Many of these activities have lead to the award of specific activity badges, but we also work towards achieving the Chief Scout Challenge Awards the highest award available in each section. Last year we had 3 children achieve the Bronze Award (Beavers), 5 children the Silver Award (Cubs) and 2 children the Gold Award (Scouts). A fantastic commitment and achievement for those individuals.
