Operation Jingles.

Our annual Christmas operation launched in December– Operation



Jingles. Officers will be targeting perpetrators of anti-social behaviour, domestic abuse, shoplifting and drink/drug driving. In the first weekend of the operation 170 people were arrested across Cheshire. Local beat teams will be providing high visibility patrols across retail areas to provide reassurance to shoppers and

to target any offenders attempting to commit crime or cause anti-social behaviour. We will also be working with partnership agencies to ensure everyone has a safe festive and New Year period.

A man who attempted to set fire to a woman's home in Warrington has been jailed.



Andrew Potter appeared at Chester Crown Court on Tuesday 28 November where he was sentenced to eight years in prison.

The 39-year-old of Thelwall New Road, Warrington, had earlier pleaded guilty to arson with recklessness as to whether life was endangered.

At around 6am Wednesday 13 September, Potter attended a woman's home address in Latchford, following a verbal disagreement the day before.

The woman, her sister, and four young children were in the property at the time.

Potter then set fire to the rear kitchen door using a quilt and two jerry cans full of petrol.

The victim and her sister noticed the door had been set alight and quickly ran upstairs.

Aiming a shower hose out the bathroom window, they were able to extinguish the fire. Once the fire was out and her family safe, the victim called the police.

CCTV enquiries identified Potter, and he was swiftly arrested and subsequently charged with arson with intent to endanger life.

Two county lines drug dealers have been jailed for their role in the supply of illegal drugs in Warrington.

Jake Cullen, 22, from Spinney View, Kirkby, and Cameron Irvine, 22, of Withers Avenue, Warrington, had earli-



er pleaded guilty to the offences and were sentenced on Thursday 2 November at Liverpool Crown Court for their roles in the drug supply.

The pair were sentenced to three years imprisonment respectively.

Crucial Crew 2023

Over 200 year 6 school children from across Warrington attended Peninsula Barracks in December to attend the annual multi-agency safety event which is designed to provide children with vital life skills and safety advice.



Each organisation put on a workshop using scenarios to bring to life different situations. Workshops explored topics including internet safety, cyber security, home safety, antisocial behaviour, safety on the railway, and the court system.

Crucial Crew is a fantastic way of getting young people involved in making a difference in their community, and it is a fun and innovative way of getting valuable safety, security

and respect messages across to young children, who will hopefully remember what they have learnt, and put this into practise, should the need arise.

Mini Police

Over 30 school children from schools across Warrington have been sworn in as Mini Police officers at Warrington Police station.

The new officers will be working as ambassadors for their schools, the community and local neighbour police teams to help improve the town.

The students were carefully selected by officers after they applied and were interviewed for their new mini police officer role, they were sworn in at Warrington Police station in front of their teachers and family.



The new officers will work alongside neighbourhood officers and their school in a number of initiatives that will help improve their local community.

Operation Sceptre



While knife crime remains low in Cheshire in comparison to other parts of the country – we are committed to doing everything we can to tackle serious violence by working hard closely with our partner agencies and other organisations to ensure Cheshire is a county that is safe, and feels safe.

Operation Sceptre, is a national campaign which takes place twice a year,

supporting the work Cheshire Police carry out all year round to ensure residents are safe from knife crime in their community.

Officers from neighbourhood teams from across Warrington undertook various activities in support of Operation Sceptre, this included officers attending local schools to give presentations on the dangers of knife crime to students, knife sweeps at open spaces across the area and officers holding community knife surrenders

You said we did

Residents raised concerns of drug dealing in the Birchwood area

We did...

Drug warrants were conducted at 3 addresses across Birchwood, this resulted in a quantity of drugs being seized and 5 individuals being arrested.

You said we did

Concerns raised about youth anti-social behaviour (ASB).

We did...

Officers in partnership with Warrington Borough Council youth workers patrolled areas across Warrington East to engage with young people. This opportunity gave us chance discuss risky and anti social behaviour, in addition to talking through some of their own concerns/worries/questions

We did...

High visibility and plain clothes patrols have been conducted across Warrington East. Officers conducted stop searches in the Woolston area which resulted in 3 adult Cautions, 4 Community Resolutions and 1 Referral to Youth Serves in relation to positive drug stops. An off-road motorbike was also seized.

You said we did

Complaints raised about underage alcohol sales in the Culcheth area.

We did...

Officers have visited licensed premises to conduct licensing checks and speak with premises managers. We have also liaised with WBC Licensing and WBC Trading Standards departments to help tackle the issue.



The Herbert Protocol is a national scheme introduced by the police in partnership with other agencies to encourage carers to compile useful information which could be used to help locate a vulnerable person if they go missing.

The initiative is named after George Herbert, a war veteran of the Normandy landings, who lived with dementia. George Herbert died whilst 'missing', trying to find his childhood home.

What is the Herbert Protocol?

It is a simple risk reduction tool to be used in the event of an adult with care and support needs going missing. It consists of a form that contains vital information about a person at risk that can be passed to the police at the point the person is reported missing.

When should the form be given to the police?

The police only need the form at the point the person is reported missing. There is no need to hand it to police before then and the form will be returned once the person is found.
